



I wondered whether the panel or solvers would do better than we did at the time. I would like to apologize to all the contributors. In total panelists and solvers sent in over 20,000 words! I try to hold the column to about 2,800. So I had to cut a lot, and some may end up being quoted at all.

#### A) WHAT SORT OF HAND DO YOU EXPECT PARTNER TO HAVE?

Dan Boye, Ken Cohen, Sam Ehrlichman, Eric Greco, Fred Neuburger, Richard Popper, JoAnn & Dan Sprung, Ros & Saul Teukolsky, Barry Cohen, Ron Danilowicz, Robert Hickes, Harry Nuckols, Barry Passer, Bill Rock, Bill Schmidt, Nick Straguzzi, and Steve White all offer variations of: Partner probably has a trap pass. He is likely to have around 16+ HCP and five or six hearts. He is hoping I will double so that he can pass for penalties. This can be deduced from the following evidence: West has at most about 11 HCP for the third seat weak two. Passed hand East has at most 11 HCP. If East has a decent hand, he has at most two hearts, otherwise he would have raised to 3H. It is not likely that both opponents are at the top of their possible range, so although he might have as little as 15 HCP, North is more likely to have 18 or more. Ed Shapiro and Pete Filandro add: ...but not a hand for which a no trump action would be descriptive: do not trap with sound no trump overcalls. This takes pressure off partner.

A few thought partner would be weaker:

**Ray Raskin**,: I expect partner to have a balanced 14 with a single heart stopper, or maybe more HCP's and only 2 spades and no heart stopper. **Connie Goldberg, and Jay Apfelbaum:** 4 or 5 hearts and less than a strong NT. **Bill Foster**: In my methods partner denies holding 12 or more HCP.

*I think the larger group is right, and if anything underestimates N's probable strength. He is virtually unlimited if unbalanced with a six-card heart suit.* 

B) WHAT DO YOU DO?NOTE: 4C WOULD SHOW CLUBS & SPADES. PASS 20  $(7\frac{1}{2})$ ; DOUBLE 12 (2); 4C 10  $(1\frac{1}{2})$ ; 2S 9 (1); 3C 8; (0) This comment could have been made by most:

**Passer:** I have three #\$%@&! points. I PASS! Why go looking for trouble? Or Greco: Pass, If I balance with 2S or 3C I am obviously going to hear an angry 3NT next. 4C could be right but it seems a bit much on a 3 count. Apfel-

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baum, Raskin, Goldberg, Shapiro, Sprungs express similar sentiments. Shapiro adds: A cue-bid by a passed hand should show a highly distributional hand including the unbid major. Makes sense to me, and I would interpret it that way at the table. Writing a book on this problem (which I have edited severely) was Straguzzi (echoed by Ehrlichman): PASS. (Double or 3C or 4C might fare better in a simulation.) So why choose pass? Bridge isn't about one deal. If I act, partner will remember the reopening with only 6-5 and a 3-count. He might shade his advances later on, and we will pay when I have full values. Given that it's very close, I'd rather pass and retain the integrity of future competitive actions.

*Raising the stakes are* **Boye** and **Popper:** Double. It is matchpoints and this appears to be a great shot at a big score based on the vulnerability. ... expect partner to have a penalty pass of 2 hearts, and a pretty big one given that this is a third seat weak 2 bid. ... not thrilled about defending with this hand ... double is likely to produce the best score.

Choosing to play rather than defend are Neuburger: 2S Can't X with 11 black cards, a H void, and a 3 count. B. Cohen and Schmidt: 3C. 4C is too high. Don't expect to make 4S unless partner has 3 spades, and it would be borderline at best even then. I'll bid a comfortable 3S on the next round, over 3D by partner or 3H by anyone. K. Cohen (with Teukolskys and Danilowicz): 4C. We could have a game and can hope that shape will compensate for the lack of points. Partner will usually choose the right suit and maybe even the right level. With 6-5 hands it is usually right to play offense and not sell out at the 2 level. Partner would love to hear double, but this hand is not strong enough to oblige.

I would guess that 2H is going down more often than not, and frequently down several. I think the winning choices are double and bid, hoping that your distribution will let you make game. But both Ehrlichman and Straguzzi make good arguments for passing. Thus is from a regional pair game where I was trying to impress my partner. At the table I chose 2S and did not remove partner's angry 3NT, which scored +400 and two and a half matchpoints on a 25 top. Partner was 0-6-3-4 with AJ10 AK in the red suits and AKJx of clubs. Most people did not have to contend with a 2H opener. Pass would have gotten 300, double 800, and club bids 1440! Those who passed can take satisfaction from their 20 points here. Those who doubled or showed clubs would have done better at the table. A 3H cue, with its ambiguity as to suits, probably would have gotten 3NT.

I have attached a sampling of comments to each group of answers. One group is mindful of the adage "do not preempt over a preempt". Raskin,

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**Sprungs, Teukolskys, Hickes, Danilowicz, Nuckols**: Pass, expecting to be able to do something later. If it goes All Pass, I'll fall out of my chair. If I bid now, partner has the right to expect that I have something other than this hand -- specifically some defensive strength. I am glad, however, that I am expected to pause for about 10 seconds before calling. I might even pause 11 seconds here.

### Another thought a minimum heart bid would be best.

**Goldberg, Apfelbaum, Shapiro, White, Straguzzi, Filandro:** 3H. Not perfect, but shows suit and seems to give us some chance at getting the auction right.... partners get used to overcalls with decent long suits and shortness in the opponent's suit, even with very few high cards. ... If by chance this matches with Problem 5, partner can bid 4N, then 5N and I'll know what to do. *But will he?* I'll be hoping it doesn't get passed out, but anything else would be way too likely to get us overboard. There is no book on how to bid a ten-card suit.

**Greco** with **Boye, K. Cohen, Neuburger, Foster**: 4H. One reason I bid 4H now is it might get confusing if I pass. If it goes 4spades on my left and 5 of a minor or 4NT by partner, now 5H sounds like a cuebid to me. How can you get a bad score for bidding with 10 hearts?? ... I will pull partner's first double. After that, we roll the dice and its every man for herself. Rule of not pre-empting a pre-empt was not intended to apply to 2-loser 10-card suits. ... Again you have fewer points than partner expects but this time you certainly have the playing tricks partner expects and possibly more. ... Either side might make a slam on this hand. 4H takes up their bidding room and 5H might suggest that partner bid a slam with spade control. ... Partner needs to have very little for 4H to make! I hope to discourage my partner from doubling a spade contract.

**Popper with B. Cohen, Passer, Rock**: 5H. ... Certain to hear 4 spades, or possibly a stronger action if I bid only 4 hearts ... end up having to guess at the 5 level anyway. So 5H, and make the opponents do further guessing. ... partner may still have some guessing if the opponents bid 5 spades or pass, but no way to avoid that. Partner is not a passed hand, so I don't get too cute. This is clearly an advance save ... Standard preemptive bid, which may keep them out of a vulnerable slam ... I don't know whose hand this is or how high to play. I'll start at the 5 level see what west and north do with all their goodies

**Ehrlichman with Schmidt**: 6H. This is the "make 'em guess" philosophy in action. Since I don't know what's right at the six level, they probably don't either.

Some general comments: 3H should show a good hand and suit. 4H should show a better hand than 3H. 5H, at least if I am your partner, is an invitation to bid 6 with heart strength. 6H is, in my opinion, as ridiculous as the problem. As usual, Eric makes good points. If you pass, partner will never believe that you have this hand. There is a general rule that you

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don't preempt over preempts, but rules are made to be broken, and there are no rules for 10 card suits.

**K. Cohen** with **Greco**, **Neuburger**, **Popper**, **Rock**, **Filandro**: 3C. A bit conservative but all of your other choices have worse flaws. Over 3D which shows extras because partner could have passed 3C I would jump to 5C hoping that I am off just the Major Aces. This feels like the classic hand where 5C makes and 3NT fails.

**Ehrlichman** with **Straguzzi, Schmidt, B. Cohen, Hickes**: 3C. My first thought was to bid 2H, but despite my big club fit and well-placed heart king, the hand has a quite few strikes against it: the stiff diamond, the moderately short hearts, and the lack of the Ace of Spades. Then 3NT. I'm a bit uncertain about this one: if partner needed only a heart stopper, why didn't he bid 3H? **Shapiro with Foster**: 3C. ... the raise does show some extra values, about right for this hand, and is not forcing. Given that partner is making a progressive bid, I'll try 3H (generically, a very sound raise), passing the buck again. I hope partner will count aces and we won't get to five off too many. Partner should not have an idea that we have nine running tricks at NT, since 3D was encouraging, not forcing. **Passer, with Danilowicz:** 3C. Shows 4+ clubs, 10-12 playing points. Isn't that what I have? Now confirm 5 clubs by bidding 4C. His last bid does not make my hand any better.

**Apfelbaum** with **Raskin, Sprungs, Teukolskys, White,** and **Nuckols**: 2H. I have very strong support for clubs, and a hand worth an opening bid in support of that suit. This is the bid that shows that hand. Then 4C. Partner's 3D bid shows a 6-4 hand. I have nothing more to contribute at this time. Partner might pass, but only with a hand holding at most one Ace. If partner happens to hold something like QJ-x-KOxxxx-AQxx, he might try 4S. It is unlikely that partner holds a singleton heart, however. West did not raise (preemptively or otherwise).

**Boye**: 2H, then 5C. After my 2H bid, think this shows good trumps and no other useful controls.

*This one came up in a national pair game I raised to 3C, then bid 4C over 3D. We played there for +170 against the eventual winners. We wound up* 

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 $6^{th}$ , less than a board behind. 3C is clearly the value bid the first time, and leaves you with a little in reserve. 2H on the first round IMO is an overbid, after which you need to pull in your horns. If you bid 3C then you can bid 3H over partner's game try. Partner, who held void xxx AQJxxx AQJx, would be able to take it from there. Bidding 5C would have moved us to second – and changed the winners.

**Danilowicz:** 6N. My partner has a spade honor, I see 2 spade tricks, 4 heart tricks, 2 diamond tricks, and 4 club tricks. I hope my vision isn't too cloudy. **Straguzzi:** 6C. Great problem. **Sprungs:** 6C. What is 4NT? Can't be quantitative, unless East psyched. 4S should be minors. *(Why? 4S might be 2 suits including H. 4N might be Blackwood.)* So, perhaps this is weaker minors. **Raskin** with **Rock:** 6C. Partner rates to have a spade void and lots of minor suit cards. **K. Cohen** with **Boye** and **Apfelbaum**: 6C. Perfect hand for partner: Heart ace and all the minor suit primes. Partner will have no reason to think we have so many controls if we bid only 5C. **Schmidt:** 6C. 11 tricks should be the limit in NT, and there is no safe way to try for 7C.

**Goldberg**: 5NT. Look for a fit, expect stiff heart. White: 5 NT. This should show a borderline decline/accept. Since our BWS range is a good 15 to 18, this is borderline. With K of spades instead of QJ, I would accept. This might also gain if partner, with a stiff spade, decided to bid 6 of a suit. I would love to sit for 6C or 6H, and would sit for 6D.

**Shapiro**: 5H. It's simple Blackwood. If I've discussed this with partner, 4N would be quantitative and I'd bid 5C, looking for a fit for slam, following with 5H over 5D. Filandro: 5H. 1NT - 4NT sequences are traditionally HCP asks ... not rational to save this sequence for invitational raise [in competition]. Partner will rarely want a final contract of NT. He is asking for Aces.

**Greco** with **Neuburger**, **Ehrlichman**, **Teukolskys**, **Foster**, **Hickes**, **Nuckols**, **B**. **Cohen**: 5C, very close to 6C. Partner is marked with a spade void to go past 3NT. It may very well take heart lead to beat slam. Do I want to hang partner for making a good overbid? My answer is usually no unless I feel like I need a top.

... If 4NT doesn't show (both minors), it should. ... With no discussion, I take 4NT as natural. Almost the only spade holding that is consistent with the opponents bidding is stiff king. 5C accepts with a 4-card club suit (not 5, else I would bid 6C). ... 6C is a distinct possibility, but if you are wrong you get a

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bottom. ... I believe partner's 4 NT call was "pick a minor". ... accept invite to 6NT but by bidding 4 card minors up the line. ... If partner meant 4NT as quantitative, might expect at least second round control of spades; can't deliver. ... more likely to show two suits. ... not willing to commit to slam at this point. If partner has red suits, I will be just as happy in 5H.

**Popper**: Pass. 4NT should be invitational. The texture of this hand does not make me think it is a maximum, so I will pass. I just don't see 12 tricks opposite an invitational hand, and we could even be off the ace king of spades if partner's invitation is based on a long minor, which seems likely given that right hand opponent opened the bidding. **Passer:** Pass. 4NT is natural (4S would be take-out) and I don't think I have a maximum (no fillers).

Can partner really have a power invitation? Even if you give East a light opening of around 9 or 10 HCP and West a zero count, that leaves only 13 for partner. So the choice is to assume East has psyched or partner is doing something unusual. If partner had hearts and a minor I think he would bid 4S, so this should be minors. Or Blackwood. This hand is from the 1969 Blue Ribbon Pairs. I was playing with Dick Spero, a good player from NYC who died a few weeks later. We wound up 4<sup>th</sup>, a few matchpoints out of a three-way for first. This hand was against one of the eventual winners. We were much less sophisticated (?) back then, and I failed to recognize a novel way of using the Unusual No Trump. Partner was 0-1-6-6 with the DA and not much else. I was allowed to make 4NT, which beat a couple of pairs in 5D, which could only make 6, but lost to the pairs taking all the tricks in club contracts. Reaching 5C would have moved us above the pair we were playing, bidding a slam would have won the event.

## The vast majority chose to Pass despite the 24 HCP and all four aces. Some

typical comments:

**Raskin (with numerous others similarly):** Pass. They are vul and we rate to get plus 500 or something similar. If they psyched us out of a slam, so be it. Offer them congratulations and hope (silently) that they keep bidding in this fashion.: **K. Cohen** adds: I would also expect my teammates to pass in first seat at unfavorable with such a bad suit. The likely contract at the other table may be 4S our way, going down with the unexpected bad trump split. The defense has a big advantage at both tables by passing. **Sprungs**: Is this the sort of hand partner has in problem 1? I hope not....Once again, the wimpy course seems best. **Popper**: We may have been robbed, but I can't see any auction that I can use to describe this hand. **Neuburger**: I am going to be truly disappointed if they make 2S! **Schmidt**: P. Should be unanimous.

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The only alternative (3NT) is way too risky.

*This problem split one couple:* **Teukolskys** with **Danilowicz, White**: 3NT. One of us wanted to get 400 the hard way, the other said she would never in a million years pass with this hand. 6 of partner's better minor could be excellent, but a double is far too likely to lead to partner insisting on hearts.

**Apfelbaum**: Double. I double because that will give partner a chance to show some values. If partner shows those values, we may be able to reach a makeable slam. There is no guarantee, of course. If we are playing Lebensohl, we will have a better chance.

This is the companion to #2. The auction started as shown, and I passed. I was somewhat surprised when the heart 10 lead found Qx in dummy, and my ace was ruffed. The cards lay badly for me, and declarer was able to escape for down 3. Our teammates did not open 2S with K9xxxx none K10x J9xx vulnerable. We lost 5(!) imps on the board when the other table stopped in 5H, and the finals of the District GNT by 7. I wonder whether, if partner had bid, I could have avoided the temptation of 7NT. Among panelists, only Ray Raskin and Saul Teukolsky duplicated both of our actions.

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This is a continuing series of articles written for the advancing player. I welcome any questions or suggestions about future articles. Please send them to the publisher. Who knows? You may be mentioned in a future article!

In previous articles, I discussed bidding over 1NT, 2NT and 1 of a major. This article will be devoted to bidding over 1 of a minor. For this purpose, we will assume the opponents remain quiet. Warning! Real life tells me to not be too confident about them being quiet.

The scoring table relegates minor suits to second class status. Therefore, most of the bids are designed to find out about major suit fits or whether the final contract will be in No Trump. However, many hands belong in a minor, so any good response structure must allow for that possibility.

I am proposing three treatments with which the reader might not be familiar. First, a jump to  $2 \bullet$  or  $2 \bullet$  [over 1 of a minor] shows 9-11 hcp and a hand that would have opened a weak two in that suit. These are invitational hands in terms of distribution and playing strength, but if opener has a poor fit, the hand belongs at the two-level. Currently, responder shows these hands by bidding his suit at the one-level and then rebidding it at the three-level. If the opener has a poor fit, the three-level could be too high. By jumping to the two-level immediately, we get some pre-emptive value plus opener can bid game with a fit and pass without one. For subsequent bids I suggest treating everything as natural and forcing, except that a retreat to the opener's suit is to play and a raise is invitational to game.

The second and third treatments are related and will be discussed together. Most advancing players are familiar with a convention known as the "Inverted Minor." This convention has strengths, but also weaknesses. Responder can show a reasonably good hand, but the partnership must make allowance to stop in three of a minor suit. This gives the partnership very little room to decide whether 3NT or five (or even six) of a

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minor is the better contract. The solution is to play the inverted raise as game forcing. The partnership will have the two and three-level to explore whether to play in 3NT or a minor contract. The subsequent auction is the same as over a normal inverted raise except that a rebid of the opener's minor suit is no longer a signoff. Show a limit raise by jump shifting to the other minor suit ( $2 \diamond$  over  $1 \bigstar$  and  $3 \bigstar$  over  $1 \diamond$ ).

The variation I describe permits the responder to hold a 4 card major suit if he has at least 16 hcp. There are hands where many the opener holds a modest hand and the quality of fit and controls make the difference slam. This allows the between game and responder to show fit in opener's minor suit as well as a major suit when slam may be possible, but there is little room to explore that possibility. The responder shows his major suit by bidding it at his second bid.

Here is the structure. We will assume a 1♣ opening bid. Over a 1♦ opening bid, a jump to 3♣ shows a limit raise.

- 1 Natural. Denies a 4 card major suit unless responder has game invitational or better values. If responder later shows a 4 card major suit, he could have longer diamonds.
- 1♥ Natural with 6+ hcp. Responder bids hearts first with 4-4 in Spades and Hearts regardless of the relative strength of the two suits.
- 1 Natural with 6+ hcp. Responder denies 4 hearts unless he also has at least 5 spades
- 1NT Balanced hand, 6-10 hcp, no 4-card major suit
- 2. Game forcing, at least 4 card support. Responder denies a 4 card major suit unless he also has at least 16 hcp.
- 2 Artificial. Shows exactly a limit raise in Clubs with at least 4 card support.
- 2♥ Natural, with a good 6-card suit and 9-11 hcp.
- 2 Natural, with a good 6-card suit and 9-11 hcp.
- 2NT Balanced hand, 11-12 hcp, no 4-card major suit.
- 3. Pre-emptive, 4-6 support points and at least 5 clubs.
- 3NT Balanced hand, 13-15 hcp, no 4-card major suit.

A boo to the ACBL Board of Directors for approving plans to hold the Spring 2013 North American Bridge Championship in Memphis. The premise for this choice is that 2013 is the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ACBL and that holding the nationals in its headquarters city will be the best symbolic way to celebrate this. Unfortunately, the hotel in Memphis is not as



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good as most of the other hotels (at the Board of Governors, we were told this without specifics as to what is inferior with the hotel). Additionally, Memphis is simply not the attraction that more major cities are. And finally, the symbolism itself may be meaningless by 2013! The ACBL is trying to sell its headquarters building; if it is successful, the ACBL headquarters may move to another city. I am pleased to note that our District Director, Craig Robinson, voted against this site. However, the Board does not seem to learn from its mistakes, such as Birmingham, Winnipeg, and Norfolk, that smaller cities are simply not the right places to go for our NABC's.

Denver, in fact, was a wonderful locale; all the playing areas were on the same level of the hotel, close together, and except for some problems with overheating, were excellent. There was a large variety of restaurants and other attractions nearby, making this the kind of place the ACBL should be going to more often.
