Back during my working days, people would ask me 'what do you win (at bridge)?' I would answer "masterpoints". Then one year

And Flight C will be held at clubs throughout the District on October 23rd. Likely locations are All Stars BC, Rehoboth Beach DE; Bridge Studio, Wilmington DE; Shore BC, Northfield NJ; Buxmont BC, Warminster PA; Harrisburg BC, Camp Hill PA; Wilkes Barre PA (see Ray Depew or Walter Mitchell); The Bridge Studio, Vestal NY; and possibly games in Syracuse and Rochester. Any club may run a game as long as they have five full tables of non-LMs less than 500 point players. Play, have a good time, win, represent your District in Louisville in March.

D4 Bidding Challenge Fall 2010 Problems

Methods are 2/1 with "Walsh"

This column is an illustration of the problems of the editor. I have included all responses from both panelists and solvers, and left them unedited other than attaching names where necessary. I ask for answers in the following format: "Bethe: 2C. With а choice of cue bids - either 2C or 2D - I pick the one where I have values." That is, the name of the respondent followed by the bid followed by comments. I ask that bids be in the form of a number followed by a capital letter for the suit, that is 2C not 2 clubs and that this convention be followed throughout the comment. I ask that they avoid colloquial abbreviations such as pard or opps. (As an aside to solvers, if you have no comments you do not need to put your name in front of each answer, but I do appreciate your full name somewhere in the e-mail.) I also much prefer that the answers be grammatically correct with proper punctuation and capital letters where needed - and not where unneeded! I would also prefer answers to be in Times New Roman type, but not necessary.

Only three of the problems are included for space reasons. The other two will be in the next column as well as the three new hands.

RASKIN: 2D. Want to see if partner rebids S or bids NT before I bid a game or stop short of one. GRECO: 2C. It is tempting to bid 1NT but I am almost too good for that and I want to see what partner does. This bid will almost always contain exactly 3 spades so it seems clear. Foster: 2 D. If partner happens to have a diamond stopper, she might bid 2 NT. I think 1NT on the first call is better than the double. My regular partners would expect at least one four card major for the double. Rock. 2D. This shows my big hand and asks partner to descibe his hand further with his first responsibility to show a diamond stopper if he has one. My partner did take a bid so he can't be broke. If partner bids 2NT, I plan to show my spade support by bidding 3S. If partner bids 3S, I will raise to 4. B. Cohen: 3S. I'll bid what I have, 3S. If I had 4 of them, I would bid 4S. Harris: 2D. I need a forcing bid. While 2C is forcing, partner might have a 4-3-4-2 bid and rebid 2H. I think that if partner does bid 2NT, that I will happily bid 3NT. If partner rebids 2H or 2S I will bid 4S. After a 3C bid, I will rebid 3D forcing. If partner rebids 3D it should show a partial stopper such as JXX and I will rebid 3NT. Nuckols 2C. I shall not raise spades with only three, so I must cue bid to show a good hand. When I have a choice of suits to cue bid, I bid the one I have something in. I hope partner's next bid won't embarrass me. Marlow: 2C. Partner has values, so I want to be in game somewhere. I will cue bid to keep notrump in the picture. GLAS-**SONS:** 1NT - the value bid. We are showing a hand that was too good to overcall 1NT directly. Douglas: 2S, planning on 3S if opposition bids further. While I have a good hand, the D Q10 are of questionable value. I would guess that the other hands are distributional since everyone is bidding. I don't see game here and want to keep the level as low as possible. 2S might quiet the opposition quickly. Straguzzi: 1NT. Presumably I didn't overcall 1NT originally because I deemed this hand too strong. Perhaps it is, though with seven nominal losers I wouldn't fault anyone who took the low road. At any rate, I see no reason not to follow through with my original plan, the lack of a firm diamond stopper notwithstanding. Any immediate spade raise guarantees four, and a cue bid is pointless. If partner has any help in diamonds whatsoever, then almost surely we want to play NT from the strong hand's side. If he interprets 1NT as showing 12-14 balanced, then I have problems far deeper than this one call. Wachsman: 2NT. This is the most descriptive bid, showing 19-21 High Card Points with a likely 3-card spade holding. Partner should be able to place the final contract with a reasonable degree of certainty about the combined assets. **SHUSTER:** 2C. Given partner's free

bid, I am willing to force to game. I suspect we are heading to 4S, but if partner can suggest notrump, then we will try 3NT. I will probably have to re-cuebid clubs for partner to properly focus on his diamond holding. 2D would be natural here, but would be wrong even if it were a cue bid. **FILANDRO:** 3S. The value bid. I hope for 5+ spades from partner but won't be unhappy if it is a Moysian. **K. COHEN** 2C cue bid the opponent suit you have better values in to try for a possible 3NT contract. **Dye:** 2NT. This is the value bid, and aims at the 9 trick game. Hoping partner reads me for 3 spades, and rebids them with 5+ spades; I will raise partner's 3S to 4S.

I have little sympathy for the immediate NT bidders. The opponents bid diamonds, and you do not have a stopper. I have a lot of sympathy for the spade raisers, but not for 2S which seems like a serious underbid.

GRECO: 4S. Unless partner is someone who goes out of their way to raise on 3 (which I think is terrible), then partner will almost always have a singleton here if they did raise on 3. Also, I don't have any convenient way to get to NT and from the right side. If I bid 3H and partner bids 3NT on xx in hearts then the lead is coming through me and I certainly can't grab NT on xxx in clubs. **RASKIN**: 3D Want to see if partner rebids S or bids NT before I decide strain and level. **Foster**: 2NT. If partner has four spades (she might NOT). I expect her to bid 3S, and I will of course bid on to 4 spades in spite of the club situation. **B. Cohen**: 4S If partner only has 3 spades, they likely have a useful shortage elsewhere. **Harris**: 3H. With 4-3-3-3 it might not be right to play in 4S. A game forcing 3H bid should be a value bid and not necessarily show 4H. Partner with a balanced hand can bid 3NT, otherwise we

will play in 4S. Nuckols 4S. Partner should have four card support, and I'm not going to dream up something exotic just because this is included in a set of "problems". Marlow: 3D -- Forcing. Not a great fit, but every other bid is a worse lie. GLASSONS: 3H. We are worried that we might be without a club stopper for NT. If partner bids no trump over 3 hearts we will be happy to play there. Douglas: 3NT. At MPs, I'll give partner the option of passing 3N and going for a top. I would like to ask partner about a club control or tell the about my heart control so that NT is safer but I don't know of a bid that is certain to convey this information. Also, the opposition might lead hearts (the other major "sometimes looks better" than minor suits) even if partner doesn't happen to have clubs controlled. Straguzzi: 3H. With 4-3-3-3 shape and eight losers, it wouldn't surprise me at all if no game was on. Even so, no red-blooded bridge player would dream of stopping in a part-score. 3H seems my most flexible option. Partner will treat it as invitational for now; if he bids 3NT, I'll pass, and over anything else (including a courtesy cue-bid in a minor), I'll bid 4S. Incidentally, I think 3D should be forcing here, though very few agree. Wachsman: 3C. This bid is not likely to be on the radar screen of your respondents, but I think it allows the partnership to reach the proper contract. The new suit is forcing for one round and gives opener a chance to more fully describe his hand. The 2S rebid limited the North hand and North's subsequent bid should clarify where North's values are. One final point is that the opening lead against the likely contract of 4S is going to be a red suited card, which should put South a tempo ahead of his competition. Rock: 3NT. Partner may only have 3 spades. I also have a balanced hand and partner should have a club stopper for his opening bid. FILANDRO: 3C. Without discussion, new suit bids are invitational "help suit" game tries. If we were in a game force (we are not), 3H would show a concentration of values inviting notrump. Besides, 3C is fortuitously low, allowing partner to bid 3S or 4S when holding 4 trumps, 3NT with a suitable maximum, and a forced/default 3D otherwise. Over 3D, THEN we can bid 3H to show heart strength toward 3NT. K. COHEN: 4S -. too strong for game try with opening bid, good spots, and fit for openers suit. 3NT could be right on some hands, but it would be taking a high risk position with xxx in Clubs. Dye: 3NT. This is purely a matchpoint action. With my tenance in hearts and extra HCPs, I will take as many tricks in NT as in spades with a heart lead. I hope partner has something in clubs and will pay off to an opening club lead if she does not. 2NT is not forcing, and any suit bid gives away more information than it figures to garner.

SHUSTER: 3H. I must try for 3NT with this shape, but the minor suit holdings suggest that it would be best played from partner's side.

I play that after a major suit raise by opener all bids by responder are forcing. In general I play that 2N is primarily an inquiry as to whether opener has four trumps. With four-card support opener bids three or four of the major, or can splinter. With three-card support opener does the appropriate thing at the three -level. I think other game tries should reassure partner that the trump suit is adequate. As to the claim that partner "should have four -card support," what is partner supposed to do with 3-4-5-1 distribution?

K. COHEN: 3D. This is a clear underbid, but Q bidding 2Hs to show more values leads to an impossible follow up bid. It is against my religion to underbid by 2 points, but this hand is an exception. Where are we going, and how do we stop in a minor part score if I start off with a value Q bid and partner bids Spades? Lubart: 2H in an endeavour to reach 3NT. B. Cohen: 2H. Seems right with my opening hand and no clear direction. Harris: 2H. The only bid that makes sense. 3C, 3D, 2NT, and 3NT are very misleading of my hand. If partner bids 2S, I will bid 3C. Nuckols: 2H. Partner is not a passed hand, so can have quite a good hand. If I had spades, I would bid them, so this should imply that I have minors (or will bid spades later to show a really good hand). If he bids 2S, I'll try 3D. I hope he's on the same wave length. Marlow: 2H. After 2S I will rebid 2NT, which should show the minors -- with any other hand I would have bid or jumped in notrump earlier. Partner could have rebid light, so I will respect a sign-off in 3 of a minor. GLASSONS: 2H. We are

planning to bid 3 clubs over 2 spades and will raise 2 NT to 3 NT. Douglas: 2D. My cards are well-place behind opener which makes me want to bid more but I don't know enough about where to play the hand or a good idea of the partnership's values since partner could be light for the reopening double. I don't like 2H because that will make partner overrate their spade cards which are of lesser value in front of opener. If 2D gets passed out, we're at an ok level. If more bidding occurs, I can bid 3C. This overrates my diamonds but does bring clubs into the picture. GRECO: 2H. I don't love it, but nothing seems clear on this hand. I will follow partner's likely 2S with 3C and hope for the best. **RASKIN**: 2H Does partner have a H card to give us a play for 3NT? Straguzzi: 2H. Not much is appealing. Even after lopping off a queen or so for partner's balancing action, I'm still too strong for 1NT, and I lack a firm heart stopper for 2NT. Whichever minor I guess to jump-bid in will be the wrong one, bank on it. The cue-bid tells partner that I have opening-bid values, almost certainly balanced, and probably without a heart stopper. Best I can do. Wachsman: 2H. The traditional cue bid in response to a takeout double is the most appropriate bid here, even if the takeout double is in balancing seat. Bridge logic should allow North to accurately picture South's hand as having the point count for strong action without the desired shape for an original takeout double. Rock: 2H. My bid tells partner that I have some points but could not double without spades. Partner should describe his hand further including bidding 2NT with a H stopper or bid his best minor without one. SHUS-TER: 2H. I will try 2NT over partner's 2S. If it suggest I need heart help, I have that. If it is unusual, I have that too. If partner is unsure, he will assume I must have both. Perfect! FILANDRO: 2H. It is true that in the pass-out seat partner could have a shaded double. Thus, it is also true that my cuebid (forcing to 2NT or suit agreement) may propel us to a non-making 4 of a minor. But 13 HCPs (12 of which are poised over any minor honor in the opener's hand) is too much to make an invitational jump - and I always guess the wrong minor anyway. Foster: 2H. I have to make a forcing bid to show partner that I originally passed with close to an opening hand. Dye: 2H. I must show the strength of this hand right away; the alternatives - 3C or 3D - share two flaws: they can be passed and they can be the wrong minor. If this is my lucky day, partner will bid 2NT which I can raise to 3NT. If partner punts with 2S, I can try 2NT myself; whether partner takes this as a shaky heart stopper or pick-a-minor we have a decent chance to land on our feet.

Please read Ken Cohen's response carefully. I vaguely prefer 3C, but I think 2H only postpones the problem and does not solve it. In addition, opposite balancing doubles bids should show at least an extra queen, as partner may well be stretching to keep the bidding open.

Problems 4 and 5 will be covered along with the two new problems in the next issue.

A Spot 4 the Advancing Player by Jay Apfelbaum (japfel@verizon.net)

This is a continuing series of articles written for the advancing player. I welcome any questions or suggestions about future articles. Please send them to the publisher. Who knows? You may be mentioned in a future article! Since beginning this series, I have been asked about several conventions. Keep asking! Your questions give me direction about what the next article should be about.

This issue we will discuss the Forcing 1NT response to a major suit opening bid. The basic description of this bid is that it describes any hand that cannot force to game and there is no other bid available to describe the hand. For the most part the Forcing 1NT is designed to give the partnership a decent chance at getting to a reasonable part-score contract and a small plus score. That leaves an incredible array of possibilities. That array can also lead to some very positive results. Let us begin by eliminating some of the more obvious hands. (NOTE: All auctions start with one of a major suit with a first response of 1NT.)

To begin, a forcing 1NT response will not have a four card spade suit because that can be shown at the one level. (Exception for those playing Flannery, showing four spades and five hearts, because opening One Heart denies a spade suit.) A forcing 1NT response will not have four card or longer support because these hands can be shown by one or more different conventional raises. A forcing 1NT will not have invitational values with a good six-card major suit because these hands are shown by an immediate jump shift to the other major suit.

The second bid by responder narrows the possibilities. For example, after the opener bids a minor suit at the two level the responder may retreat to two of the major suit. This shows 6-9 high card points plus two card support for the major suit. Bidding a new suit below the opener's suit at the two level shows a poor hand with a long suit (usually six or more). A bid of a new minor suit at the three level shows a mildly invitational hand with a good suit (usually six or more).

A simple raise of opener's second bid (whether or not a new suit) shows invitational values and enough support to be pretty sure of at least an eight-card fit. A jump raise of the opener's first bid suit to the three level shows three card support and game invitational values. Game forcing hands with three card support are shown by a

jump to four of the major suit.

Balanced hands with no major suit fit and invitational values are shown by bidding 1NT and then 2NT. Stronger hands rebid 3NT. Note that it is poor technique to jump directly to 3NT because the opener may have a distributional hand. The need to show that distribution may result in the partnership getting to a second best contract.

There are some finer points that the reader may find interesting. After the opener rebids two of a minor suit, the responder should raise with invitational values. Sometimes, however, the responder's hand is so strong in support that a simple raise just will not suffice. If the opener started with bidding One Heart, the responder could bid Two Spades on the second round. The bid cannot be natural because the responder would have bid One Spade earlier. And the bid cannot show support for the opener's heart suit because the responder would simply show that support. Therefore, the bid shows fabulous support for the opener's minor suit and a hand too strong to give a simple raise. This bid may help the partnership find a makeable game and so I recommend it for your bidding arsenal.

The Forcing 1NT is a very inaccurate method for getting to a great part score contract. However, that very inaccuracy can provide opportunities when the opposition enters the auction. The opposition will often not be in a position to know if your side has found a fit or not.

When the strength is evenly divided between two partnerships, there is a real chance the opponents will enter the auction. If they do so with a double, the next hand may redouble to show extra values. The opener will usually have 16 or more high card points for this redouble and the responder will usually have at least 9 or 10 high card points. The message here is that the opposition might be in trouble and we might have enough high card strength to extract a healthy penalty.

If the opposition overcalls, a double by the responder in the direct chair tends to show length in the suit overcalled. It also denies a fit for the opener's suit or suits. As much as anything else, this kind of double suggests the hand is a misfit and we should let the opposition struggle with it instead of bidding on. On the other hand, a double by the responder in the pass out chair tends to show extra strength rather than anything in particular in the oppo-(*Continued on page 28*)

sition trump suit. The reason for the difference is the relative the University of Pennsylvania strength of having length behind the bidder compared to having it in front of the bidder. A double by the opener in either position tends just to show extra strength.

There are a number of players who will rebid 2NT after the opposition comes into the auction. In general, this is losing bridge. With invitational values a double is best because that at least promises the balance of power. This gives the opener maximum room to make a winning choice. That could mean leaving the double in or bidding again with a distributional hand. The opener can always bid 2NT if his hand suggests that as a good choice. A 2NT bid by the responder is better used to compete in a minor suit where the responder is not sure which suit is better.

Consider this example: the opener starts with One Spade and then rebids Two Clubs after our Forcing 1NT. The next hand interferes with Two Hearts. If we hold five or six diamonds and four clubs we may want to compete in one of these minor suits. The problem is that we cannot be sure which one is best. The opener might have two three-card minor suits, or possibly five clubs and only one diamond. Bidding 2NT tells the opener our hand so that he can make the right choice every time.

Where are they from?

Often you can tell someone's background from by their bids. For example, when the bidding has gone Pass-Pass-Pass and the 4th person opens 3NT, you can safely ask where they served when they were in the military. When this was first pointed out to me, I wasn't sure whether or not my leg was being pulled, but I started asking. Sure enough, military. And, interestingly, it seems to work more than it should.

Do I recommend this? Not sure. Those of you who use this bid, let me know about your experiences.

Personally, I like using the Rule of 15 (aka Cansino Count) in 4th seat... add your HCP and the number of spades in your hand. If it comes to 15, open. If not? Don't. The concept behind is that once you open in 4th seat, it's like pulling your thumb out of the dike... everyone will get in the act. That means you either need control of the spades (so you can open spades usually) or you've got a nice rebid.

But don't ignore the Military 3NT. If it was good enough for General Eisenhower, it might be worth exploring.

Next we have the (in)famous "short club", where if you open 1♣ and your partner has a complete bust, they must bid 1♦ "so you don't get stuck in clubs" in case you're short. Now honestly. This bid is a tip-off the people are from the Suburbs and not used to Big City Bridge. They actually think that the opponents are going to pass out a 1♣ bid. And so what if they do? If the 1♣ Opener's pard passes, the opponents should have the bid. Right?

Last but not least, here's an amazing one for you. Here's the bidding (I saw this with my own eyes):

Now. Before guessing where these people are from, answer the following questions:

- 1. How many points does North have?
- 2. How many hearts does North have?
- 3. How many points does South have?
- 4. How many hearts does South have?

Answers: North has 12-14/15 points and 6 hearts. South has 6-9 HCP and no more than 2 hearts.

And our next question. What would possess South to bid 3Ψ ? Did he find a King on the floor? Discover another heart tucked in with his diamonds? None of the above. He thought he should let his partner know he had 8 points.

Moving on to North. He thought he had ended the auction with his 2Ψ bid. I asked him why he went to 4Ψ after his partner's squirrelly bid. Answer? "Well, we weren't vulnerable, so why not."

How far did they go down? Two. What a surprise!!

Please let me hear from you about your crazy bidding experiences and your news of the weird. Our game is the greatest, and astonishing things happen.
