

This month I invited Steve Robinson of Washington, D.C. to join our panel. Scores this time are fairly high as problems 2 and 3 were virtually unanimous.

Scores: Yes 10 (9); No 5 (4)

Whether you agree with playing "DON'T" or not, you need some way to show an unusual hand over the opponent's opening 1NT, whatever the strength of the opening. In any case, in the context of this question, the "Ayes" have it by a narrow margin among the panel but a large margin among solvers.

Sam Ehrlichman: Yes, if your agreement is that 2NT shows any powerful two-suiter. Bergen's original article on DONT ("Bridge Today", Sept. 1989), 2NT shows a powerful major-minor two-suiter and 3NT shows both majors. But I will assume for part B that your agreement is "any powerful two-suiter," since you've chosen to bid 2NT on this one. Ken Cohen: I agree because you have this monster 2 suiter. I am bidding at least game and slam is a possibility with the weak NT. I do not like the 3H bid as I would have jumped to 4H. I would not give my partner a chance to pass but the bid pays off because you hear a jump to 4S. Ray Raskin, Richard Popper, Dan Boye, Bob and Joann Glasson: Yes, we agree with 2 NT showing a big two-suiter. Barry Cohen, Harry Nuckols, Steve White: Yes. Only reasonable choice. Bill Schmidt: Yes. 2H would be non-forcing. Bill Rock with Pete Filandro: Yes. 2NT shows an unspecified strong two-suiter. This hand is too strong to bid 2H, which could be passed. Would like to be playing 2C or 2D showing majors so you could rebid 3H to show strength. You might double and then bid 3H but want to show both suits. Nick Stragguzzi: YES. ... I'd ask partner up front how he prefers to show strong two-suited hands. Steve Robinson, Ros and Saul Teukolsky: Yes. Must force to game.

Craig Robinson: No. I would double and then bid 4H over 2C, 2D, or 2H and 4S over 2S. If we have a slam, partner will have to bid it. **Eric Greco with Barry Passer**: Basically disagree. I don't DONT over weak NT. **Jay Apfelbaum**: No, I would bid 2H. The 2NT bid should show a really wild two-suited hand, most likely in the minor suits. Partner will assume minors, and choose the better fit. If Partner's choice happens to be Diamonds we will correct to Hearts, but Partner will think the choice is between Hearts and Clubs. Also, if my opponents take the auction to the five-level in a minor I will have to make a guess about competing without any real clue about the quality of Partner's fit. **Ed Shapiro**: No. Anything other than a pragmatic bid on a direct heart track (double or some number of hearts) in this fantasy is an odds-off view. Playing

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primitive "natural," 2NT shows a very strong hand, at least in playing strength, usually 2-suited. But here, in the context of DONT, partner will likely believe you're showing minors and will take your heart bid over 3 of a minor in that context. Thus, 2N is both wrong and a partnership killer. **Douglas Dye**: No; 4H. Bid what I think I can make, rather than produce an obscure auction like the one presented here.

This certainly qualifies as an extraordinary hand. As to what partner should expect when you bid 3H, I would say some big 2-suiter including hearts and a black suit, not necessarily both majors. With a major and diamonds you would have corrected to 3D. I believe that no matter what your basic methods over 1NT, you need a bid that partner will not pass. Partner will (should) pass a double with a few cards. Partner might pass an artificial takeout for the majors with weak hands short in the majors and long in the bid suit. I think 2N then 3H should be forcing!

B) What now?

Scores: Pass 6 (5); 4NT 10;(3); 5C 2 (1); 5D 8 (1); 5S 8 (1); 6S 7 (2)

Some answers reflect a belief that this hand has already been shown, including the fact that the two suits are majors.

Apfelbaum with Raskin, Greco, Glassons: P. We were lucky that partner preferred Clubs. The correction to 3H clearly shows both majors and a wild hand. North already knows South has a freakish distribution. Otherwise, South would have bid 2H. However, North may be stretching to game based on that knowledge. He could have bid something else if he had a slam try. As I said above, I think the only suit your partner knows you do not have is diamonds. But I think any "cue bid" should support hearts, and partner needs a way to support your second suit strongly. Shapiro: P. I'm just happy that we have gotten to a playable spot. Slam could be on, or five, down. If partner (correctly in my view) is splintering in response to my heart cue-bid, we're simply out of luck. I have no way to get back to hearts. As a matter of philosophy, it pays over the long run to assume that neither partner ever forgets our system. In case of incontrovertible proof of confusion, you just have to take a shot at something nonforcing and hope it's right. The only corollary to this is that 6NT ends all auctions. Nuckols: P. I expect partner to have some length in spades. Good, but I need two of three key cards to make a slam, and I have no way of discovering if he has them. At the other table, I expect they'll have a similar problem after a minor suit opening bid. Filandro adds: ... Partner could have cue-bid with interest, or, with interest but nothing to cue, could have bid 3S and allowed me to cue-bid with interest. Partner's 4S is akin to the standard sequence 2C - 2D - 2S - 4S.

Some answers seem to think that partner has shown some positive values.

Connie Goldberg: 4NT. If partners shows an ace, I'll gamble its in a major and bid a slam. **S. Robinson**: 4NT. Will bid a slam if partner has one ace. Too dangerous to cuebid a minor since we might not be on the same wavelength. 6 spades will make if he has one major-suit ace. **Ehrlichman, with Schmidt similar**: 4NT. It looks odd to bid Blackwood with a void. But the ace of clubs is a useful card, since it will allow us to dispose of a diamond. It would be nice to reach slam opposite Axxx x QJxx xxxx or the like, but I don't think there's a bid I can make that allows partner to evaluate correctly. The one bid I will not consider is 5C, since that is how I would have bid with a heart-club two-suiter. *Right on*. *Which shows the error of* **C. Robinson**: **SPRING 2006** 17 5C, and over 5H I would bid 6D. Over 5S, I would bid 6S. Rock: 5C. To show first round control and see what my partner bids over this slam try. I think this runs the risk of being the final contract! If you are going to cuebid, then the following makes more sense: Teuks: 5D. There's no perfect slam try with this hand, but 5D may get partner to ignore club strength Passer: 5D. Did my bidding already show both majors? If so I cuebid 5D. If North's 4S was not a preference, then I bid 6S (4NT should be to play, not Blackwood). Not possible when you have shown a two suiter. A good example of why I don't like crazy conventions! Straggs: 5D. ... Pass is more consistent (with 3H on the previous round); 5D is just my way of trying to catch up for my underbid the previous round, but it's not a call I am proud of. Dye: 5D. Trying to win the post-mortem. Since I don't know what my bids mean, how can I possibly know what partner's replies mean? If he thinks my sequence is invitational with both majors, then 4S shows decent values and my 5D is a cuebid confirming spades and inviting slam. If he thinks my bidding shows a forcing hand in hearts, then 4S is a splinter inviting slam and my 5D is a cooperating control bid. K. Cohen with B. Cohen: 5S. I hope partner would raise to a slam with a major suit Ace and, hopefully, the A of clubs K or Q of diamonds. I may get lucky if the weak NT hand has a normal club lead and partner's diamonds go away on my hearts. White with Popper: 6S. I expect partner has at least one major suit ace; let opening leader guess. If partner has both aces, he'll bid 7 (there's no chance he'll bid 7 with only the spade ace; I would have used grand-slam force if that were enough. I hope he won't consider 7 with just the heart ace). Boye: 6S. After the 4S call by partner there isn't an accurate way to find out if partner has a correct Ace. If I bid 5C, the defense benefits and is more likely to find the lead that could beat the slam. I simply raise.

As I said above, I think 2NT followed by 3H showed a strong two suiter including hearts and not diamonds. Partner's 4S bid should mean "whichever your second suit, lets play at least game." I don't know how else he says that. I do not think that 4S is possible with no high card strength. I have given the movers a better score than the shakers because there are 8 of them and only 5 passers.

At the table the player doubled, and scored -180 when everyone passed and declarer won the HA and cashed his six card club suit. Partner held AJxx, x, QJxx, Jxxx. Teammates, who had saved for 300 in 5C, were not amused.

Two panelists thought partner had shown a strong hand with good clubs and were willing to risk RKCB:

Greco (and similarly Glassons): 4NT or whatever is Blackwood. Isn't this the easiest Blackwood bid you have ever seen. If partner shows all four we will bid 7, if not, 6 clubs.

Almost all the rest, including all solvers, bid 4C with plaintive cries that "this is forcing!"

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and not 4NT for fear that partner has only two key cards.

S. Robinson: 4C. Actually I would bid 4D (RKC for clubs). Since 3D is forcing, 4D should be RKC. If you're not playing one-over-bids as RKC, you're still in the 1990's Four keycards – 7C; three – 6C two—5C. One should not cuebid if RKC will answer all questions. Partner has to have xx/Axxx/x/AKxxxx plus another honor. The problem with 4C is that partner might not have a spade control and how do you stop in five if partner has x/KQJx/x/AKJxxxx. Goldberg, Nuckols: 4C. If I could bid 4D kickback, I would do that. Since I cannot, 4C, planning on cue bidding 4S over 4D or 4H. I think bidding 3S may seem ambiguous at this point. **Teuks**: 4C. Make sure partner knows what is trump! K. Cohen, Popper with C. Robinson, B. Cohen, Dye, Rock, Schmidt: 4C. Seems right. It is surely forcing, will tell partner I have club support, and invite him to start cue bidding. Ehrlichman: 4C. Lots of playing strength in clubs; 3NT is a severe understatement of the hand's power. I would bid 4C at matchpoints as well. Apfelbaum (with Passer similarly) adds: 4C. It can be a problem to describe a hand this good when there are no clear understandings. If I could be sure that Partner would understand 3D to confirm that 1S was fourth suit forcing, I would do that. I, for one, would think that you had diamonds. If partner would understand 4D to be RKCB for clubs, I would do that. 4NT is not a good choice. Partner might have only two controls, and then we cannot get to our best game, 5C. Filandro: 4C. ... Bidding 4C now will let me Key-Card in Clubs after partner's 4 of a red suit. I think you can bid 4N, key card in clubs right now. White: 4C. Set trumps. At least it's forcing. 4NT would not be Key Card. Straggs: 4C. ... I must show partner my excellent club support and no bid is better than a straightforward raise. Danny Kleinman suggests a useful rule in cases like this: when a partnership goes past 3NT to explore for a minor suit slam, a subsequent bid of 4NT by either partner is natural and an offer to play. Note that S-Qx H-Jxxx D-A C-AKJ10xx produces a near-cold 6C but a poor 3NT. Raskin: 3S, followed by a club raise to show the stiff H and interest in more. Boye: 3S. After 3S I expect partner to bid 3NT in exasperation. I will then bid 4C suggesting a slam. If partner can cue bid the DA I will bid Blackwood. If partner bids 4H I will bid 4S. Shapiro: 3S. A repeat of the 4th suit, forcing with probable values, if not true length in the suit, has become a standard part of 4th suit forcing auctions. I plan to bid more – this would be tougher at matchpoints – removing 3NT to 5C, strongly implying heart shortness. Fortunately, partner is an expert, so won't have delusions that my threestepping it before bounding to the 5-level has anything to do with "fast arrival.

Despite all of the comments above, I am not convinced that 4C is forcing. Yes, if partner had bid 1NT, 2C, 2D, 2H or 2S, 3C would be forcing. What would you do, however, with a normal looking 7 or 8 count with, say, a stiff heart and three clubs. All bids are fraught with peril here: 3D sounds like your own 64, 3H or 4H sound like hearts, 3S sounds like your own 5-6. Partner does not know that 1S was the start of a forcing auction, and 4C will not clarify. So I think the Gs are right. It is almost inconceivable that partner does not have at least 3 key cards (in clubs), and you should bid Blackwood. And I think all those who think 4D should be RKCB are even more right.

This auction underscores one of the problems with the BWS agreement that "2/1 gf except after rebid." The issue here is partly why didn't partner jump shift immediately, and why didn't partner raise no trump?

Shapiro: 4S. Easy. My 2NT bid – unless followed by unusually strong actions – shows less than a 1NT opening (probably without honor third in diamonds), and this hand is very sound within that range. So I cue-bid and hope partner does something right. Over 4NT (not Blackwood since no jump-shift), I'll continue with 5C. The failure to make a strong but not slam-forcing jumpshift here is meaningful, and my lack of a higher trump could be a negative. Just bidding six makes, hoping to get lucky opposite eight solid diamonds, but I'm gonna try to be a little more scientific. K. Cohen: 4 S. I am making a slam try again. Partner must have some kind of hand to bypass 3NT. It is not clear what 4NT by me is or what 4NT by partner would be. C. Robinson: 4S. This is a pretty good hand. Apfelbaum, Boye, Ehrlichman, Goldberg, Popper, Raskin, B. Cohen, Dye, Filandro, Nuckols. Passer, Rock, Schmidt, Straggs, White all offer versions of: 4S. I seem to have a fine hand for partner - rich in controls and good trumps in context. Hopefully, partner can take over. Anyway, I hope partner can do something other than bid 5D. Even if partner bids 5D (in tempo, I pray) I'm not quitting. What slam try is partner supposed to make over 4S with, say, x Ax KQJxxxxxx? Which is why I agree with S. Robinson: 4H. (RKC for diamonds -21st century bid. If I had good hearts, I wouldn't bid 2NT. We belong in slam, unless we're off two keycards. Glassons with **Greco**: 4NT or whatever is Blackwood here. Since partner breezed past 3NT, he must have slam interest and we like our controls. If partner shows 3 controls, we'll play 7D, if he shows only 2, we'll play 6 NT to protect the heart king. Teuks: 4NT. RKC Blackwood. (Since BWS forces partner to jump to 4D with a good hand, 4NT can't be natural - there has to be a way to ask for aces.)

My two cents: 4N, imo, should be an attempted signoff and anything else a cue bid unless you play some version of kickback or "redwood". Most of the panel, who play 2/1 gf and some sort of conventional responses at the 3-level, are not prepared to deal with the issues in the BWS context of the rebid being nf and the failure to js to 3D on the first round. Diamonds are trump. You have too much to cue bid: first and/or second round control of all the side suits. When I was growing up I was taught that if you are in a clear cuebidding situation and you don't, it means you either have nothing or you have everything. I would have great sympathy for a direct 6D, and would understand 5D because with a control poor wonder you should try to signoff in 4N. If you are going to cuebid, I think 4H is better than 4S as otherwise partner may worry about losing the first two heart tricks.

A good summary of what I believe is the real situation:

Dye: PASS! Partner is 6-5 and suggesting hearts as a trump suit. As my 4C shows more than a limit raise and no spade control, partner would likely take a different action if short in spades; therefore, I assume two fast losers and elect to play in the best matchpoint spot. I expect AKJ10x or no worse than AK109x in hearts from partner; on latter layout we are OK for plus 420 if defenders get their diamond ruff in the hand with four trumps. **Ehrlichman**: 5D. First of all, partner is patterning out, not cooperating towards slam. I am sorely tempted to pass, it being matchpoints, but playing in the 5-1 instead of the 6-6 seems to be a pretty big position, and will work out badly if partner's heart intermediates are poor.

The rest of answers are purely looking at slam prospects in diamonds. Raskin, Boye, Glassons, Filandro, Passer, B. Cohen, Nuckols, Rock, Schmidt, Straggs, White all say approximately: 5D. Partner is clearly asking (begging?) for a second-round spade control. My answer is "Go Fish". I don't have a spade control, and 5C should show a second club control (although this hand is so good, I'm tempted to bid 5C anyway), so I have to settle for 5D. Playing with Mary, her 4H would have been RKC. 5D would be right then also. Teuks: 5D. Even in matchpoints, 5D making scores better than 6D down one on a spade lead. You've shown your extras with 4C, so it's up to partner to go on with a spade control. **Popper**: 4 NT; this can't be Blackwood here, and my best shot at getting partner to bid a slam with a spade coutrol. Greco, C. Robinson, Goldberg: 5C. Partner with a spade control will bid 6D, unless very light, e.g. x, KJxxx, AJxxxx, x but that would not make sense in light of the bidding. This seems like a clear bid as opposed to 5D as partner does not know with AJ10x of hearts that there are no heart losers. K. Cohen: 5C. Even though I do not have second round club control the only thing I care about is if partner has second round Spade control and he is forced to bid 6D on this Auction if he has it. Apfelbaum: 5C. I have a great deal better than a limit raise. I bypassed the spade suit last time, so this will be the second time to bypass it. I should be showing a very good hand with no spade control, but just about everything else. Shapiro: 5C. By a nose over 5D. Spades aren't controlled yet, and my 4C bid already has shown the "or better" hand, so this might be a bit pushy. If partner continues with 5S, we'll get to seven. I bid 5C, expecting the finesse to be on if we need to produce the second club control we'd be showing. But I'm really tempted to bid a "system-bedamned," DI-like, progressive 4NT. If partner could have bid 4H, natural over 2NT, I'd find different inferences here. But I bet a large percentage of the panel would consider it a splinter, maybe even rightly in our default system. S. Robinson: 5C. My bid should really be 5D showing two keys with the queen since 4H should be RKC for diamonds. However, I will cuebid my club which would deny a spade control but show extra values.

There are two sensible cuebidding agreements: the Italian school, in which bypassing a suit SPRING 2006 21

denies both first and second round control, and the American school, in which first round controls are bid before second. In the Italian school, partner's 4H bid would show both a second heart card AND a spade control – because you denied one. In the American school, both of you are looking for a spade control. All of these agreements should only apply when both partners know that they are in a cuebidding auction. If you think you are cuebidding and you subscribe to the Italian school, you should bid 6D. In the American school, I think 5D is enough. I submit that in this auction you may still be searching for the right game!

Listen carefully to this man's analysis: Straggs: 2D. An underbid, but from the opponents' silence it seems as though partner is short in diamonds and has extras. 4-4-1-4 is my guess. He's probably coming with a third bid, but if it goes all pass then 2D might be our best spot. And then again, maybe not. If partner has only two spades and more than one diamond, and, therefore, 2-4-2-5 distribution, his spades are likely to be AK, AQ or possibly KQ. If partner has three or more spades he will have one or zero diamonds. Which suggests that the following bidders have their noses buried in their hand and are not trying to listen to partner (and the opponents) also: C. Robinson,

Raskin, Nuckols: 3D. 6-1 fits play fairly well. Passer and similarly the **Teuks:** 3D, invitational. With the Q's in partner's suits, this is worth more than 2D. Even if I hit a singleton D in dummy, I'm safe. Filandro: 3D. If partner passes with short diamonds, I'll rely on my diamond spots. The absence of spade bids by anyone increases the likelihood of partner's dreaded 4,4,1,4 shape, so treading lightly for now is the prudent course. Note: As the footnote to Hand 2 indicates, if I bid a 4th suit 1S now and my next bid is 3D (over partner's 2H "punt" or 2S "raise"), I will have created a game force to, most likely, an 11-trick contract. Too high!

Taking individualistic views are: Boye: P. I expect LHO to either bid 1S or make the classic 1 suited t/o double. Partner can then clarify # of clubs with a 2C rebid. If I get to act over a 1S call, I intend to bid 2D - showing 3H and 6D. Greco: 1S. If the system is as I think it is, over partner's likely 1NT bid I can bid a non-forcing 2D. Over anything other than 1NT this hand has gotten a lot better. Like 3S maybe? More conservative but still looking mainly at their own hand are K. Cohen: 2D. This is a book bid and any other bid is not. Apfelbaum: 2D. I have a good hand IF partner has a diamond fit. Otherwise, this is just another hand with a minimum rebid. I might be tempted to bid more at IMP's because of the game bonus. S. Robinson with B. Cohen, White: 2D. With six good diamonds, diamonds should be trump. Matchpoints is plus scores and partner would need two spade stoppers and diamond help to make 3NT. At IMPs I would bid 3D. Rock: 2D. See what partner does. If partner bids 2NT, I would then bid 3H.

My own philosophy is to raise partner's opened or responded major with three card support, but not to raise a second suit without four. So while I think the following group shows better understanding of what to expect, I respectfully disagree with their conclusion: Gold-22

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berg, Glassons, Popper: 2H. Showing a good 3-card raise because this is matchpoints. It's more flexible than 3D. I think it gets across my lack of a spade stopper, and gives partner room to rebid clubs. Shapiro: 2H. 2D with a partner who doesn't play 4-3 fits very confidently, but you owe me an expert partner. The extra high cards and shape make up for the relatively weak and short holding, and I like how major partials score on these hands. Keeping the auction simple can be a plus in itself. And you can now bid descriptively and aggressively if partner makes another move. **Ehrlichman**: 2H. Partner is unlikely to have more than one diamond. While we probably have an 8-card club fit and only a 7-card heart fit, that's not a lock, as partner could be 4-4-1-4. At matchpoints I'll risk the 4-3 in order to be in the higherscoring strain. I hope that if partner has a good hand and moves on, he'll be savvy enough to bid 2NT instead of too many hearts. Likewise, if they compete in spades and partner chooses to compete with 3-4-1-5 shape, I hope he bids 3C and not 3H. Why would he? He will expect 4-card support, Connie's comment notwithstanding. Dye: 2H. Partner is unbalanced and will often have a singleton diamond. If partner cannot bid again, we rate to be in the best partial. Playing Walsh style (isn't that, in effect, a part of BWS? No, hb.) partner will expect no more than three hearts from a hand w/o invitational strength. Schmidt: 2H. 3D is tempting, but I don't want to encourage partner to bid a speculative 3NT, with no side entry to the diamonds.

I think the choice is between 2C and 2D. You have a maximum for either bid, but partner is more likely to bid again over 2C as he will be encouraged by the fit. Also, we have at least 7 clubs, perhaps only 6 diamonds between us. I like playing with more trumps than the opponents. Straggs makes a good point: the opponent's silence suggests that partner has some spade length and probably also extra high card strength.

A Spot 4 the Advancing Player by Jay Apfelbaum (japfel@verizon.net)

This is a continuing series of articles written for the advancing player. I welcome any questions or suggestions about future articles. Please send them to the publisher. Who knows? You may be mentioned in a future article! Since beginning this series, I have been asked about several conventions. Keep asking! Your questions give me direction about what the next article should be about.

This month, I will discuss the Lebensohl convention after we open 1NT. The partner of the opening bidder bids 2NT to force the opener to rebid 3C. It applies only when the next player overcalls 2D, 2H or 2S. It is easier to play 'systems on' after either a double or 2C overcall (double is Stayman). There are three major types of responding hands after partner opens 1NT: Signoff, Invite Game and Game Force. Lebensohl gives us a way to show all three types of hands.

Using Lebensohl, the way to signoff is to bid a suit at the two level (if the suit is higher than the overcall suit) or bid 2NT and then show the suit at the three level (if the suit is lower than the overcalled suit). For example, after an overcall of 2H the responder bids 2NT and then 3D to signoff in that suit. A direct bid of 2S is a signoff in that suit.

To invite in a higher suit, first bid 2NT and then show the suit at

the three level. For example, after an overcall of 2D the responder bids 2NT and then either 3H or 3S to invite game. A direct bid of either 2H or 2S would be a signoff. There is no way to invite in a "lower" suit.

To force to game, bid the suit at the three level.

There are two ways to ask opener about a four-card major suit and two ways to bid game in No Trump: directly and after first bidding 2NT. All four force to game. The way to ask about a four-card major is to cue bid opener's suit. If we cue bid immediately (e.g., 3H over 2H), we deny any help in that suit for No Trump purposes. If we bid 2NT first (e.g., 2NT and then 3H over 2H), we promise help. The same is true for 3NT. An immediate 3NT bid denies any help in the overcalled suit for NT purposes. If we bid 2NT first and then 3NT, we promise help.

It would only be fair to mention there is an emerging theory that reverses the way to signoff and force in three of a lower suit. An immediate bid of 3D (over 2H) is merely competitive, while first bidding 2NT and then 3D is forcing. My advice for the moment is to not use this alternative, but be aware that others might. So ask if it comes up.

Here is a schedule of responses and their meanings.

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For many years, I have watched our Regionals change from having one event per day to multiple events per day. The initial change was to introduce flighted events. Separate senior events followed a few years after that and then stratified events appeared on the scene. For many years almost all events were either pairs or Swiss teams. Then the concept of bracketed knockouts was introduced and these have virtually taken over regional tournaments. Many tournaments have a new knockout event starting every day and the pair events have become tiny in comparison to them. Almost every day players of all ability levels can choose from among several different events to enter.

Many of these changes are good; players of all abilities like knockout events, and those of us who chair regional tournaments certainly have an obligation to provide bridge in the format that people want. Knockouts are one of the best forms of bridge competition; when you play against just one other team over the course of an entire session, the team which plays better will usually win (yes, you can

still win by being lucky). As a co chair of the next Wilmington Regional, we will provide more knockout events than we ever have before, and we hope a large number of you will attend next March.

However, not all of the changes have been good for bridge. Players who play in the lower brackets of knockout events have no opportunity to play against good players. lt may not be fun to get beaten by experts, but it provides invaluable experience in improving your bridge. And the sheer popularity of knockouts has made pair events at many regionals so small that they don't always deserve to be called Further, our profesevents. sional players play almost exclusively in the knockout and Swiss team events, so that even some of our Flight A events are not what they used to be. I would hasten to add that at least in this District, Lancaster and Cherry Hill still manage to run large events which are not knockout events.

I am sure that all the regional tournament chairs in the district will continue to schedule many
